Diagram locating Pinneberg in Germany








Pinneberg Geography

- State of Schleswig-Holstein
- Seat of Kreis Pinneberg (County)
- > 11 miles NW of central Hamburg
- ► Land area = 8.32 sq. miles
- \triangleright Population (2020) = 43,503
- Now exurb of Hamburg



Ancient History, Gothic Europe

- Romans never cross Elbe River
 - Germania not occupied by Romans
 - Gothic Europe distinct from Roman Europe
- Pinneberg bit east of the Elbe
 - Romans do not get there





Next 1400 Years


- Gothic Europe remains tribal
 - Patchwork fiefdoms
 - Holstein attains cultural identity
- Hamburg becomes Hanseatic City
 - Independent of feudal rule
- Pinneberg yet to exist



First Political Identity: Kingdom of Denmark

First polity of Holstein, in 15th Century...

- By Denmark
 - 400 years, approx.
 - Danes are lax rulers
 - Castle built for Count of Schauenburg
- Start of Pinneberg and county of Schauenburg-Pinneberg






Schloss Pinneberg (Castle)

- Pinneberg exists from its castle
 - First medieval castle, circa 1200.
 - Danes capture (1370), by Count Adolf VIII of
 - Shauenburg.
 - Danish rule.


- Grander Renaissance castle rebuilt (1472)
- Heavily damaged during 30 Years War
- Danish King orders castle torn down (1720).

Pinneberg: Danish Government

- Law court ("Dingstatte") first mentioned in 1358.
 - Court formalized under Danish rule (1370)
 - Mention of settlement around the castle, by 1600.
- Danish King absorbs County of Pinneberg as royal holding
 - Schauenburg line ends (1640)
 - Local royal chief administrator appointed
- Town grows near old castle site
- Pinneberg recognized as township, in 1826
 - Gets royal law court
 - Railroad arrives in 1844, boosting prospects (pop. in 1845 = 1087).
 - Excursions to countryside, from Hamburg, become common



Pinneberg Layout

- Drostei built (1765)
 - Town reorients around it
 - Town Square in front
 - Roads from Hamburg intersect there
- Remains basic town configuration, with additions:
 - Railroad
 - Autobahn
 - Modernization





Wars for Schleswig-Holstein and Germany

- Denmark & Prussia fight two wars for Schleswig-Holstein (1848-51 & 1864)
- Prussia wins second war
 - Annexes Schleswig-Holstein
 - Pinneberg becomes Prussian
- More Prussian wars with Austria, then France
- German state declared(1871) under Prussia
 - Pinneberg becomes German





Pinneberg, Prussian & German Administration

- Kreis Pinneberg (county) created (1867)
 - Prussians organizing new territories
- German State consolidated (1872)
 - Pinneberg named county seat (1875)
 - New county offices built (1893)
 - All govt. offices in Der Drostei previously
- Incorporated as a Pinnebergdorf (city) (1905)
 - population = 6074
- Pinneberg has 10 factories, by 1900
 - Largest: Wupperman Mill, employs 600

Pinneberg: World War I +

- > WWI: town industries convert to armaments
- War shortages cause civilian hardships
 - 271 Pinnebergers die in military service
- War fronts are far from Pinneberg
- ➤ After WWI, Treaty of Versailles
 - Danish border moved
 - Holstein remains German (with Pinneberg)
- German economy suffers in 1920s
- > Depression causes business bankruptcies
- Economy booms under Natl. Socialists in 1930s
 - Town population nearly doubles (to approx. 14,000)

Pinneberg: World War II +

- Large military base, two small prisoner-of-war camps, and quartermaster warehouse
- Town industries again convert to armaments, some forced labor used
- Mostly spared the heavy bombing of Hamburg
- > After WWII, Pinneberg in British occupation zone
- A million displaced German refugees resettled in Holstein.
 - 9753 resettled in Pinneberg (prior pop. = 14,682). 400 more come later.
 - Refugees are German, mostly from East Prussia,
 Silesia and occupied Poland
 - Severe living space shortage occurs.

How German is Pinneberg?

- Was: Gothic tribal, Feudal, Danish, Prussian, then German
 - Drost is Dutch word/title: bailiff of castle or lord.
 - More historic variety than conspicuous.
 - Post-war resettlement may be key 20th century demographic occurrence.

Binne & Sohn, Roofing Mill


- 1885 today






Pinneberg v. Rockville: Population Growth

Pinneberg and Rockville have different growth patterns



- Pinneberg grows in the 19th century because of early industries
 - Large 1930s spike is Natl. Socialsts economic boom
- Rockville remains small, on slow growth path



- Pinneberg growth in later 20th century, is flat linear mostly
 - Resettlement spike occurs immediately post-war
- Rockville has post-war suburban high growth path, and another boom in the 21st century
- At 1957 Sister City founding, cities near the same size



Pinneberg Places: Der Drostei

- Central edifice of Pinneberg
 - Anchor of the city square.
 - Built 1765 for royal executive, official residence and government seat
 - German Rococo style
 - Since 1970, a Cultural Center

Pinneberg Places: Pinneberg Museum

- History and art museum
 - Built in 1892, as court building, separate from the Drostei.



Pinneberg Places: Bahnhoff [Train Station]

- Railroad arrives in 1844. Train station built.
- Now on the Hamburg S3 subway line.

Pinneberg Places: Christuskirche

"Christ Church"

- Pinneberg became independent Lutheran Parish in 1890
- Church completed in 1894
 - Neo-Gothic style, cruciform layout
 - On Bahnhoffstraße, next to Fahlt Holzs (park)

Pinneberg Places: Parks

- Fahlt Holzs (woods), 74 acre, forested park in midst of city today.
 - Historic attraction, often destination for day outing Hamburg-ers





- Pinneberg-Rosengarten
 - Roses culturally significant to area
 - Pinneberg home to a number of horticultural orgs. & businesses
 - First Holstein Rose Festival in 1927
 - Rockville has gift roses from Pinneberg



Pinneberg Places: Feuerwehrwache



- Pinneberg also has a long-standing volunteer fire brigade
- Fire departments in Rockville and Pinneberg are tightly connected via Sister City exchanges.
